Sanctuary

North end has temporary tables and benches for picnicking.

PNE staff observed picking up garbage. Sanctuary generally clean although snocone cups, beer tops, cans, bottles, paper, food and condoms among items observed under trees, along paths and in water.



Wildlife sparse with some Mallards, Barn Swallows, Glaucous-winged Gull, North-western Crows, Black-capped Chickadees, Pigeons, Cabbage Butterflies, Dragon flies and one Great Blue Heron on wood in middle of south pond.


Thistle going to seed ~ good gold fish food but no birds in sight!

Dead roses south of north bridge have been removed. Wild roses blooming near boat launch.

All prickly bushes trimmed back from trail and underbrush left natural; good for bird habitat.

Mountain Ash covered in orange berries.





Oak tree which was planted in last couple of years, on east side, south of east bridge, is stressed/dying.

A spray of delicate Jewelweed.





Along south and east pathways are tall forests of thistle plus extensive blackberry and the every present bindweed or morning glory.

Lots of vegetation and weeds growing in north pond as it has been all but empty most of the summer.

No circulation of water at all.






Sanctuary frequently observed to have a total absence of people.

Unemptied garbage can. At least the can has not been dumped in the pond as frequently happens.

Recycling containers not as obvious as in previous years.

No vehicles parked on grass around western entrance to Sanctuary as in previous years. Noise from Playland louder than Dal Richards' band.

Italian Gardens

Temporary Festival Stage provided entertainment for fair patrons.

Car painting, an event that has been at the fair for several years, not that popular.

Minimal litter throughout.





Some beds have been completely replanted; gardeners must have figured that removing horsetails and other weeds would be impossible. Other beds clogged with weeds, still others very dry.

Christopher Columbus's garden has been cleaned up, although CC still has white eyes.

Display bed of flowers at the Triumph Street entrance looks good. All garden beds in the Italian Garden should look equally as good.

Fountain spout, second from north, doesn't work and hasn't for a long time.

Brass plaque with "Hastings Park" on it on top of concrete column furthest to the right has been missing for years. When is it going to be replaced?





Bocce courts covered with squares of plywood. Why???

Next year install fence along edge of the allee so that residents can have access not only to the skateboard bowl but also grassy boulevard, bocce courts, Columbus garden and Memorial to Italian Immigrants garden since so few fair patrons use area.

Momiji Garden

Public excluded from garden.

Lots of temporary structures for VIPs with garden well-kept and clean.

Cordoned -off garden often seen totally empty.

Stream very pretty and water circulating well, unlike Sanctuary.



Empire Bowl

Generally clean but some litter in the southeast quadrant and in Leeside tunnel where there is no garbage can nearby.

All slopes around Empire bowl are thick with weeds and invasive species.

About a dozen people in the Bowl jogging, walking or sunbathing.
